



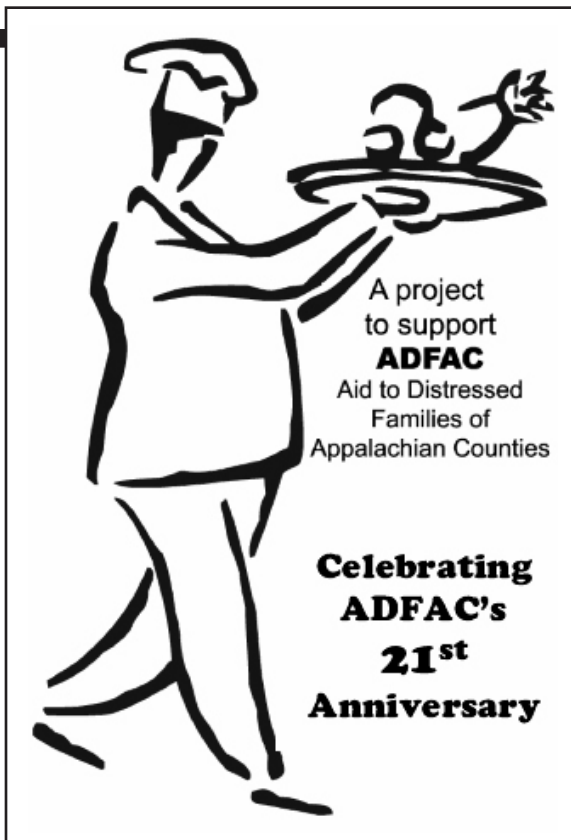

New partnership to bring clean water to Appalachian families

More families in rural Tennessee and Kentucky may soon have access to safe drinking water, thanks to a proposed partnership between ADFAC, Living Waters for the World (LWW) and Rotary International.

The mission of LWW, an organization affiliated with the Presbyterian Church USA, is to provide simple, affordable, water treatment systems primarily to communities in developing countries around the world. To date, LWW has installed over 160 systems in 19 countries.

ADFAC and Rotary International will work with LWW to bring their expertise to remote coal mining communities in Claiborne County, Tennessee and Whitley County, Kentucky. Low-income families in these areas who have contaminated water from existing groundwater wells or nearby springs

will be eligible to apply for assistance. ADFAC and LWW will install new water wells and/or water treatment systems for approved clients. These point-of-entry systems provide simple filtration, water softening, and ultraviolet-light-polishing of well or spring water supplies to remove the sediment, metals and biological contaminants prevalent in coal mining and oil and gas extraction areas of Appalachia.

Program beneficiaries will share the cost of the systems by repaying low-interest loans, which will be deposited into a revolving loan fund used to help additional families.

Funding is currently being sought to launch this new effort. ADFAC and LWW hope to install 5 new water wells and 25 new water treatment systems over the next year.

2008 School Supplies drive serves record number of Anderson County students

This year, **1,385** disadvantaged K-12 students arrived at school prepared and ready to learn.

990 Anderson County students received backpacks, supplies and vouchers for shoes or clothing -- *the most Anderson County students ever served by the program!* Additionally, 370 Morgan County students and 25 Roane County students received backpacks and supplies.

Over \$50,000 worth of supplies were distributed over the three-week period in July and August. In 2008, the School Supplies program was supported

by contributions made by hundreds of individuals and volunteers as well as grants from the **Aslan Foundation**, the **Peyback Foundation**, the **Helton Foundation**, **Variety of**

Eastern Tennessee, and the **Food Lion Charitable Foundation**.
